Dad goes to a dangerous foreign country, leaving the family at home to fend for themselves, but life must go on for the Norris sisters...


Beth dreams of being in the school musical, especially when super cool Josh gets the lead part.

About The Book

In response to the uncertain world we live in, teenage author, Nigel Hinton, has written *The Norris Girls*, inspired by a classic nineteenth century novel.

Nigel Hinton says: "The idea for *The Norris Girls* began when pupils asked me two questions during a school visit. The first was, 'Why do you always write about boys?' and the second was, 'Why do writers always write about unhappy families?' Shortly after that I read *Little Women* and adored the story of the March sisters. Here were loving, supportive girls carrying on with their lives against the background of the threat and danger of the American Civil War.

Remembering this, Nigel decided to try to write a twenty-first century equivalent of the book. Described as 'a total page turner' by Jacqueline Wilson, *The Norris Girls*, tells the story of three sisters; Beth, Georgy and Katie.

Beth, Georgy and Katie Norris are part of a close and loving family. They squabble and fall out and compete with each other like girls do but their relationships are underpinned by love. They adore their dad who goes to a dangerous country to help in a humanitarian project to build a dam. While he's away they each carry on with ordinary life, pursuing their passions – pony riding, athletics and acting. Then their lives are shaken up by their dad being taken hostage by terrorists, in the same way that the girls in Little Women have to face the wounding of their father in the war.

Nigel continues: "I was conscious that kids and teens nowadays live with terrorism and hostage taking as an ever-present background to their daily lives. They are daily being told about the hostile world out there and I wanted the book to be upbeat, optimistic and positive despite the difficult times we live in. So I tried to make these girls, led by their mother, an example and comfort to the readers. In the face of the threat to their dad, they close ranks, strengthen their loving bonds, and find the will to carry on living, dedicating their achievements and little triumphs to him. The terrifying situation brings out the very best in each of them and consequently brings out the best in the people round them so that love and friendship defeats the cruelty and danger of the world. I deliberately left the identity of the terrorists vague because I didn't want to make the book a political statement but rather concentrate on the life-affirming strength to be found in a loving family and network of friends even at the worst of times."

The sisters throw themselves into their hobbies and passions – music, acting, horse-riding and charities – and focus their energy on their own goals and ambitions. Cathy Cassidy, author of *The Chocolate Box Girls* series of books, is also a fan of *The Norris Girls*. She says: "A warm, wise and all-round wonderful read about the bond between three very different but equally awesome sisters... I loved this book!"

Nigel has a fantastic reputation for children's writing, as the author behind the magical *Beaver Towers* series and the Federation of Children's Book Groups Award winning *Finders*. *The Norris Girls* will be the author's twenty-seventh book, following a hugely successful writing career spanning over two decades. His previous titles have won countless awards, including the Children's Book of the Year Award, the Federation of Children's Book Groups Award and the Federation of Children's Book Group Pick of the Year.

Nigel has also written for television, film and theatre. Nigel's best-known teen book *Buddy* was adapted for a five-part BBC television series, and then later its sequel *Buddy's Song* was adapted for a film. The emblematic series starter is one title in Penguin Books' collection *The Originals*, in the company of Dodie Smith, Berlie Doherty, Robert Swindells and John Steinbeck.

About The Author

Nigel Hinton was born in London in 1941. After leaving school, he worked in an advertising agency for two years, before deciding to study English at university. He then trained as a teacher and taught for ten years at a school in Tonbridge. It was then that he wrote his first book and has been writing ever since.

Nigel has written over twenty books including the best selling Buddy novel trilogy (adapted into a television series Buddy and movie Buddy's Song). He also wrote the popular Beaver Towers book series, which has been adapted for TV.
